



#### Percent of ACT Test Takers Enrolled in College Preparatory Courses in High School, 2000-2004




ACT has identified a strong relationship between course-taking patterns and college readiness. ACT core courses are recommended to increase the probability that a student will score a 21 or higher on the ACT test, and to ensure eligibility for the PROMISE Scholarship and admission to most postsecondary institutions. The courses that make up the ACT core include: 4 years of English/language arts; 3 years of mathematics; 3 years of social sciences; and 3 years of natural sciences.

Since 1999, West Virginia has experienced a 25% decrease in the number of students reporting the completion of the ACT core. Deficiencies in social science and natural science course-taking have been identified as key contributors to this decrease.

Over the past five years, West Virginia students have shown steady improvement in ACT composite scores, which have closed to within three tenths of a point of the national average.

There are several factors that may help explain this increased performance. Eligibility for the PROMISE Scholarship requires students achieve a 3.0 grade point average in the core, as well as an ACT composite score of 21 with a sub-score of 20 in each subject area. High school teachers and counselors are encouraging students to be better prepared for the ACT test, and recent data indicates a sharp increase in the number of students taking the ACT more than once in an attempt to improve scores.

MMENTARY

As West Virginia composite scores continue to improve, ACT sub-scores are also on the rise. Between 2000 and 2004, sub-scores for all West Virginia test takers have improved in every area except science. Although significant deficiencies between West Virginia and National averages for math and science continue, West Virginia students are now close to the national average for reading and have exceeded the national average for English.

Outreach and incentive programs such as Gear-Up, Talent Search, PROMISE, and HSTA may be significant influences on improved performance of students entering West Virginia colleges and universities.

Developmental courses do not count toward degree credit hours, but are essential for under-prepared students. A common goal for secondary and post-secondary education is to improve performance levels of high school students and to enable them to be successful in college.

Developmental course enrollment has shown a slight, but noticeable, improvement since 2003. Overall developmental math enrollment has decreased two percent, down from 30% in 2003. Developmental English has decreased by one percent, from 17% in 2003. Total developmental enrollment (including courses in other developmental areas) is down four percent from 35% in 2003.

OMIMENIARY

Developmental education is a critical service for students who are inadequately prepared in one or more areas. This service is especially important for non-traditional students (age 25 and older) who finished high school several years ago and need to brush up on basic academic skills. This table shows that 59% of non-traditional students required developmental education in 2004, and that two-year institutions are providing a significant proportion of these courses.

This table shows developmental enrollment by degree objective to demonstrate developmental activity levels between the two-year and four-year systems. No matter where the students are located, developmental enrollment reflects poor preparation for incoming students and jeopardizes retention and graduation rates down the line. Although Senate Bill 448 created an independent Community & Technical College System, some institutions continue to offer both two-year and four-year programs through contractual arrangements.



College Going Rates of Recent West Virginia High School Graduates, 1996-2003




**JMMENTARY** 

The college going rate of recent high school graduates is a good measure of how much progress West Virginia is making toward increasing the level of college participation for young adults. From 1996 to 2003, the West Virginia college going rate has increased from 46.9% to 59.4%. The state has now exceeded the most recently published national average of 56.7%.

National reports continue to project a decline in West Virginia's high school graduate population. Our state's steadily increasing college going rate indicates better participation from our existing high school population and supports modest, but steady, enrollment increases for West Virginia institutions of postsecondary education.

The examination of college going rates by county offers a geographic roadmap to more effectively focus and concentrate communication and outreach efforts to increase college participation in all areas.

Headcount enrollment for West Virginia public higher education increased by 2.5% over the past year. Four-year institution headcount enrollment increased by 2.2%, and two-year institution headcount enrollment increased by 3.3% over 2003 levels.

This chart demonstrates the headcount enrollment at each institution, broken down by degree level.

MMENTARY

Full-time equivalent (FTE) enrollment demonstrates the workload undertaken by each student based on 15 semester hours for undergraduate and first professional students, and 12 semester hours for graduate students. Students taking these course loads are counted as 1.0 FTE. FTE values higher or lower than 1.0 are possible depending on the number of semester hours taken. FTE enrollment for West Virginia public higher education increased by 2.5% over the past year. Four-year institution FTE enrollment increased by 2.2%, and two-year institution FTE enrollment increased by 3.6% over 2003 levels.

This chart demonstrates the headcount enrollment at each institution by degree level.

Applicant, admission, and enrollment levels are good indicators of an institution's accessibility, desirability, and ability to convert applicants into tuition-paying enrollees. Since 2002, the number of applicants to public higher education has increased by six percent, the number of acceptances has increased by one percent, and the percentage of accepted applicants enrolling has remained constant.

All community and technical colleges maintain a 100% acceptance rate in keeping with their open access missions.

**JMMENTARY** 

Transfer of students from one institution to another is a measure of how well institutions are cooperating to offer educational opportunities to students. Transfer activity within the state demonstrates the extent of seamless delivery of educational services among institutions. The statewide transfer acceptance rate for 2004 was 95%. Since 2002, transfer activity levels have remained virtually unchanged.

Statewide, the majority of transfers come from within the public higher education system. This year, however, 39% of students transferred in from out-of-state institutions.

The first to second year retention rate has become an important factor in predicting overall success in student outcomes. A substantial area of potential improvement for graduation rates is to focus on why students are not returning for their second year as full-time students. The most recently published national figure on first to second year retention is 74%. West Virginia's overall first to second year retention rate is 68%.

Administratively-linked institutions experience higher transfer rates between campuses due to contracted degree programs and the pursuit of baccalaureate completion degrees.

**MMENTARY** 

West Virginia public higher education institutions have been encouraging adequately prepared high school students to enroll in college courses while they are still in high school. This allows these students to get an early start on a postsecondary degree and thus enables students to complete a degree within a shorter timeframe.

Although enrollment of high school students fluctuates greatly from institution to institution, West Virginia has seen little change in overall enrollment levels. In 2002, there were 4,480 high school students enrolled in college courses. These numbers have decreased slightly to 4,456 in 2003 and 4,239 in 2004.

Note: West Liberty State College did not report enrollment of high school students in college level courses for Fall 2004.






The cost of education has been steadily increasing over the past five years. In that same time period, student reliance on grants and scholarships has increased from \$144.6 million to \$243.2 million, an increase of 68%. Reliance on student loans and employment has increased by 54%, up from \$174.6 million to \$269.4 million.

The total number of students in West Virginia receiving some form of aid has increased from 49,730 in 1999-00 to 61,028 in 2003-04. This represents a 23% increase over the past five years.



Paying for college should not be a stumbling block for anyone who wants to pursue a postsecondary degree. In addition to federal and institution-specific aid programs, West Virginia offers students a wide array of financial assistance options, regardless of student background or degree objective.

West Virginia operates three primary state-level financial aid programs. The Higher Education Grant Program services students demonstrating financial need. The Higher Education Adult Part-Time Students (HEAPS) Grant provides need-based aid to non-traditional students. The Providing Real Opportunities Maximizing In-State Student Excellence (PROMISE) Scholarship provides merit-based aid for students with high test scores and high school GPA's. The state maintains several other financial aid programs for students pursuing careers in fields such as education, medicine, engineering, science, and technology.



An important role for the community and technical college system of West Virginia is to deliver workforce development programs to train and educate workers to strengthen our economy. Over the past year, there have been significant increases in this activity. The number of participating students rose by 5,815 students, and the number of training contact hours delivered has increased by over 500,000.



#### Research Grants and Contracts, 2000-2004



The total amount of research dollars brought in from outside sources is a measure of the research activity undertaken by West Virginia institutions. Research activity not only bolsters positive graduate education outcomes, but positively impacts economic development within the state.

Two significant research funding increases occurred in 2001 and 2002, with levels in the \$150 to \$160 million range.

In an attempt to provide a balanced measure of student credit hours to faculty, this table demonstrates the total number of student credit hours delivered at each institution, divided by the corresponding number of FTE faculty. The resulting quotient is the total number of student credit hours delivered on average by each faculty member. An instructor teaching 20 students in a three credit course would produce 60 student credit hours. A higher ratio indicates a heavier workload for the average faculty member at any given institution.

One way to ascertain an institution's focus on instruction, research, and public service is to determine the proportion of these expenses in relation to education and general (E&G) expenditures. In this case, E&G Expenditures were calculated by taking total reported operating expenditures, less scholarships/fellowships, auxiliary, depreciation, and other expenditures.

For baccalaureate institutions, the graduation rate is computed by taking a beginning cohort of first-time, full-time, degree-seeking students and measuring the number completing their degree within six years (150% of the normal program time). The statewide average for four-year institutions is 41%. In 2003, the national average graduation rate for baccalaureate institutions was 54%. Increasing the graduation rates for West Virginia institutions to better match the national average is a clear and critical goal.

Notes: Bluefield State College coded many first-time students as having a two-year degree objective, although these students moved on to pursue a baccalaureate degree. This impacted the starting number and resulting graduation rate on this page. Potomac State College of WVU is a two-year institution, but is not associated with the Council for Community and Technical College Education. Potomac's starting cohort and graduation rate are for two-year degree objective students completing their degree within three years. WVU at Parkersburg is a two-year institution associated with the Council for Community and Technical College Education, but also maintains some four-year programs. For community and technical colleges, the graduation rate is computed by taking a beginning cohort of first-time, full-time, degree-seeking students and measuring the number of students completing their degree within three years (150% of the normal program time). The statewide average for CTC institutions is 11%. In 2003, the national average graduation rate for two-year institutions was 31%. Although increasing the graduation rates for West Virginia institutions to better match the national average is a clear and critical goal, it is important to note that CTC institutions often enroll non-traditional students who take longer than the traditional 150% timeframe for degree completion.

For this year's report card, the request was made to expand the look into the graduation rates of the community and technical colleges. Although computing graduation rates within 150% of the degree timeframe is the national standard, it does not take into account the non-traditional component of the CTC student population. Many adult students enroll in a two-year program with the intent of completing a degree, but take more time to do so because of work or family obligations. By expanding the completion timeframe to five years, this table captures the additional graduates generated by each institution. In this case, an 11% statewide average expands to 19% when considering the longer timeframe.


This table expands the graduation perspective even further by tracking graduates, regardless of degree type, across all West Virginia public institutions. This perspective recognizes the fact that many students start out pursuing a two-year degree, but then transfer to complete a four-year program at a baccalaureate institution. Under these constraints, the statewide graduation rate for the Community and Technical College System rises to 24%.

(Exams Taken July 1, 2003 - June 30, 2004)





(Exams Taken July 1, 2003 - June 30, 2004)





(Exams Taken July 1, 2003 - June 30, 2004)





(Exams Taken July 1, 2003 - June 30, 2004)





## Resident Graduates Working or in College in West Virginia After Graduation, 2001-2003



## Average First-Time Earnings of Resident Graduates Working in West Virginia, 2001-2003





Increased earnings are among the greatest motivating factors in pursuing a higher education degree. The following table demonstrates the average first-year earnings of recent West Virginia higher education graduates. It is worthy of note that associate's degree holders are now steadily earning more in their first year after graduation in comparison to bachelor's degree holders. This is attributed largely to the high-demand fields in medicine and engineering offered through community and technical college programs. Long-term earnings potential, however, is likely to favor the higher degree holders.

Developmental education courses do not count toward degree credit hours, but are essential for underprepared students. A common goal for secondary and post-secondary education is to improve performance levels of high school students and to enable them to be successful in college.

Since 2003, overall developmental math enrollment has increased four percent, up from 53% in 2003. Developmental English has also increased by four percent, from 34% in 2003. Total developmental enrollment (including courses in other developmental areas) is up four percent from 59% in 2003.

The resulting quotient is the total number of student credit hours delivered on average by each faculty member. An instructor teaching 20 students in a three credit course would produce 60 student credit hours. A higher ratio indicates a heavier workload for the average faculty member at any given institution.

Graduation rates are an important measure of institutional success at community and technical colleges.

For community and technical colleges, the graduation rate is computed by taking a beginning cohort of first-time, full-time, degree-seeking students and measuring the number of students completing their degree within three years (150% of the normal program time). The statewide average for CTC institutions is 11%. In 2003, the national average graduation rate for two-year institutions was 31%. Although increasing the graduation rates for West Virginia institutions to better match the national average is a clear and critical goal, it is important to note that CTC institutions often enroll non-traditional students who take longer than



the traditional 150% timeframe for degree completion.

Although computing graduation rates within 150% of the degree timeframe is the national standard, it does not take into account the non-traditional component of the CTC student population. Many adult students enroll in a two-year program with the intent of completing a degree, but take more time to do so because of work or family obligations. By expanding the completion timeframe to five years, this table captures the additional graduates generated by each institution. In this case, an 11% statewide average expands to 19% when considering the longer timeframe.

This table expands the graduation perspective even further by tracking graduates, regardless of degree type, across all West Virginia public institutions. This perspective recognizes the fact that many students initially pursue a two-year degree, but then transfer to complete a four-year program at a baccalaureate institution. Under these constraints, the statewide graduation rate for the Community

and Technical College System rises to 24%.
